•In July, profile visits on Twitter totalled a number of 3,868. This had risen by 420.6% from June












Trends in HCV testing in Scotland's 4 largest NHS Boards

 Long term injectors who have avoided hepatitis C can be seen as 'positive deviants' – people who have managed to 'stay safe' in environments of high risk.



- Types of drugs
- Technique
- Poor knowledge and awareness
- Access to testing and treatment



- prolong the life of veins once they collapse, they're gone for good.
- Take time and be careful
- Give the used veins time to heal
- Inject at least one centimetre away from last injection site
- Try not to inject below a recent hit on the same vein: go above it (towards the heart) so the previous site is not irritated twice.
